of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common Defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posteriority, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

Article I.

Section. 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section. 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of the State in which he shall be chosen.

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding together the whole Number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three fifths of all other Persons. No State shall, however, have less than one Representative, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, each State shall add or lose one Representative, until the whole Number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every Thirty Thousand, but each State shall be entitled to choose one, New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose one, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia eight, North Carolina five, South Carolina four, Georgia three, Connecticut four, Rhode Island three, Massachusetts five, New Hampshire one, Vermont one, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia eight, North Carolina five, South Carolina four, Georgia three, Connecticut four, Rhode Island three.

When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority of such State shall issue Writs of Election to fill such Vacancies.

The House of Representatives shall chuse their other Officers, and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

Section. 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof for six Years; and each Senator shall have one Vote.

Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Clap, they shall elect their President, and, if they can not agree in choosing one, by ballot, at the Expiration of the sixth Year, and, if they still do not agree, by ballot at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Year, and so every Year, until they shall have chosen one, and thereafte, if they shall be divided, they shall be equally divided. Resignation, or otherwise, during the term of their holding their Office, which shall then fill such Vacancies.

No Person shall be a Senator who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State, and who shall have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and who shall be a Citizen of the United States, and who shall have been six Years a Resident therein.

The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall not, when he exercises the Office of President, or when he shall exercise the Office of

The Senate shall choose their other Officers, and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments, and shall have the sole Power to determine on Trial, they shall be on Oath or Affirmation. When the President of the United States, the Chief Justice shall preside. And no Person shall be removed without the concurrence of two thirds of the Members present.

Judgment in Cases of Impeachment shall not extend further than removal from the Office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any Office of Trust or Profit under the United States: but the Party convicted, shall nevertheless be liable and subject to Indictment, Trial, Judgment and Punishment, according to Law.

Section. 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof, but the Congress may at any time by Law make general Laws concerning Elections.

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such Meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by Law appoint a different Day.

Section. 5. Each House shall be the Judge of the Elections, Returns and Qualifications of its own Members, and a Majority of each shall constitute a Quorum to do Business; but a smaller Number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the Attendance of absent Members, in such Manner, and under such Penalties as each House may provide.

Each House may determine the Rules of its Proceedings, punish its Members for disorderly Behaviour, and, with the Concurrence of two thirds, expel a Member.

Each House shall keep a Journal of its Proceedings, and from time to time, publish the same, excepting such Parts as may in their Judgment require Secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the Members of either House, on any Question, shall be entered on the Journal.

Neither House, during the Session of Congress, shall, without the Consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other Place.
